New CGS Directors Find Collaboration Is Key to Success

The University of Pittsburgh College of General Studies (CGS) recently welcomed two new staff members: **Boryana Dobreva**, director of academic programs, and **Adam Robinson**, director of the McCarl Center for Nontraditional Student Success. Both have infectious enthusiasm for nontraditional education.

Boryana Dobreva

In her new role, Dobreva develops, manages, and assesses the college's academic programs and instructional curricula. She is passionate about working with the CGS-affiliated faculty to provide students with courses that are pedagogically sound.

"The hallmark of the College of General Studies' innovation is that courses are interdisciplinary in character, and I am looking forward to strengthening connections with instructors across the University in creating new interdisciplinary programs for our students," says Dobreva.

She also will work closely with faculty members on transitioning some of the face-to-face courses to an online modality. "We need to be in tune with the times and be able to provide academically rigorous programs that offer flexibility to a wider range of students, and online courses will definitely play a key role in that effort, as will self-paced and hybrid formats."

Before Dobreva begins to develop any new programs, however, she is rigorously reviewing and evaluating current CGS programs, assessing their strengths and where gap areas may exist. Dobreva explains, "As we evaluate our current programs, we are looking to identify courses that provide a high level of student satisfaction, meet the needs of our students, enhance their résumés, and prepare them for the demands of the job market.

"In the few months that I have been at CGS, I have seen the hard work and dedication of CGS staff to improve student satisfaction," says Dobreva. "My objective is to move the educational mission forward by creating and developing programs that are hands on and practice oriented so our students stand out in the job market and are able to successfully move to the next level."

Dobreva comes to the University of Pittsburgh from Northwestern College in Orange City, lowa, where she most recently served as director of global education. She holds an MA in Germanic language and literature and PhD in German studies from the University of Pittsburgh in addition to an MA in German philology from Shumen University in Bulgaria. When she is not running after her two young sons, she enjoys traveling internationally and taking walks through her neighborhood.

Adam Robinson

As director of the McCarl Center, Robinson oversees and executes McCarl Center programs, works with student organizations, and supervises the academic advising unit and the Office of Veterans Services.

His first few months at CGS have been a whirlwind of getting to know staff and students as well as forming valuable partnerships with various entities across the University, including the University Honors College, Study Abroad Office, and Academic Resource Center.

"I am thrilled to have met such extraordinary professionals who are dedicated to student success. I now have a better understanding of the outstanding resources available to students and can direct the students appropriately," explains Robinson. In the future, Robinson would like to develop collaborative programming with these entities to provide additional support to CGS students.

One of Robinson's first priorities is to build student awareness about the McCarl Center. "My goal is to make the McCarl Center the hub for students—a comprehensive one-stop shop for all of their academic and social needs," says Robinson. "I invite and encourage all CGS students to come to the McCarl Center beyond what is required. Stop by and visit with our career consultant, meet with our math tutor, visit with the advising team, take our workshops, or just hang out and study. This space is for students, and I want students to know that it is their space to use."

Robinson, who has an open-door policy, encourages students to talk with him about resources that they would like to see offered through the McCarl Center. "I certainly understand that going back to school is an important decision that requires students to put themselves in a new environment, which can be daunting. By talking with students and hearing their concerns, I can better understand how CGS can help them to fit in, succeed, and have a more enjoyable and enriching experience."

Robinson will continue to schedule McCarl Center workshops, particularly on writing and math, which he feels are points of anxiety for students. "Through these discussion-based workshops, I would like students to come away with a better understanding of how to develop processes and habits that will not only be beneficial throughout their academic careers but also provide success outside Pitt."

Future plans for Robinson include working closely with the Pitt Alumni Association to discuss ways in which CGS can continue to be a resource to alumni as well as how alumni can partner with current CGS students through internships and mentorships.

Prior to coming to Pitt, Robinson served as the associate director of the University of Louisville Writing Center. He received an MA in English from the University of Louisville. In his spare time, Robinson loves to take long walks through his urban neighborhood; play guitar, bass, and ukulele; and take in the local history of Pittsburgh.

In return for the College of General Studies' faith in accepting me into this university (one that is superior to any other school that I could have attended), I am enthusiastically dedicating as much of my time and energy as possible in support of CGS and, simultaneously, improving the value of my time at Pitt.

Most of my energy is spent volunteering with the CGS Student Government. I am a veteran liaison to the University Senate and represent CGS in the Educational Policies and Computer Usage committees of the University Senate. In addition to those worthwhile positions, I am active as a CGS student ambassador, helping first-year students to transition to CGS. I also enjoy organizing and participating in the annual welcome back barbecue and the CGS prefireworks celebration at homecoming, which are student government-sponsored events. I am here to help in any capacity because CGS Student Government is such a beneficial organization for nontraditional students at Pitt.

As a veteran, I can say without a doubt that the Office of Veterans Services and the College of General Studies are very supportive of student veterans. The Office of Veterans Services (OVS) makes using the GI Bill a painless process. Scholarship Provides Second Chance

College of General Studies (CGS) social sciences major and Students with Dependents Scholarship recipient **Shavon Blannon** began her undergraduate studies at the University of Pittsburgh as an excited 18-year-old eager to learn. As a first-generation college student, she knew that a college education would set her apart from others. However, by the beginning of her junior year, challenges in her personal life began to take over and she withdrew from school.

Now, 25 years after she left school, Blannon has returned to the University of Pittsburgh through the College of General Studies as a 43-year-old mother of two, enthusiastic and ready to complete her degree. Her fiancé, Cliff, a Pitt graduate, and her children–Bria, age 21, and Christopher, age 11–have been very encouraging and supportive.

"Completing my degree is important to me for many reasons," explains Blannon. "First, it will allow me to establish a career in human resources with my current employer, to be more marketable in the field, and to have the ability to advance from my entry-level position. More importantly, however, is that by completing my degree, I will be a true example to my children that secondary education matters and can make a difference in your life. Besides the potential financial impact

that obtaining a degree can make, upon graduating, I will be an example of courage, tenacity, and ambition to my children.

"Often, adult students are intimidated and apprehensive about returning to school. CGS and the Students with Dependents Scholarship provided me with the support I needed to continue my education and have enough funding to reach graduation."

After graduating in spring 2016, Blannon plans to begin her graduate studies within a year.

The Students with Dependents Scholarship supports individuals who have a deep commitment to both reaching their educational goals and enriching the lives of their dependents. By educating parents and guardians, CGS is educating families and communities about the value of a college degree.

He questioned whether he was up for the challenge of balancing long work hours and personal commitments with classes and homework and whether being out of the school system for so long would be a hindrance to him.

Bullock came to Pittsburgh by way of North Carolina, and when he stepped onto the University of Pittsburgh campus; saw the Cathedral of Learning; and met with Kaitlin Yacob, director of recruitment and enrollment for the College of General Studies (CGS), he knew Pitt was for him.

"Between Kaitlin; my advisor, Jessica Roscoe; and the Office of Veterans Services outreach coordinator, Leah Albert, I really felt like I found a home and community where I could fit in," says Bullock. "While it was initially intimidating to be surrounded by people who are younger than I am and who seemed to be more plugged in with the academic setting, I have learned that the students are quite curious about me, my life, and the things that I have done. I am delighted by it and now see it as all of us being here for the same reason and working together to accomplish that goal."

The College of General Studies' McCarl Center for Nontraditional Student Success is like a base camp to Bullock. It is where he can always find a quiet place to get away for some time to study or just collect his thoughts on what needs to be done that day or during the week.

"I am honored to have been given this opportunity at this point in my life to pursue a dream that I have had for so long. And I get to do it at an incredible

institution with the greatest people in a city that I love. I love being a CGS student, and I whole-heartedly recommend it to anyone who might be interested in taking a chance at going back to school," says Bullock.

After he graduates in spring 2017, Bullock plans to continue his education at the Pitt Graduate School of Public and International Affairs. He is interested in pursuing a Master of Public Administration degree and an international organizations MBA in Geneva, Switzerland. Ultimately, he would like to work for the U.S. Department of State or an international nongovernmental organization or charity.

Nicola DiCio (BS '05)



What was your most memorable moment as a student?


"Most definitely it was graduation. It felt really good [to be] finishing something that I had started so many years before."

CGS Academic Advisors

The College of General Studies (CGS) academic advisors—**Tim Carr, John Oravetz, Jessica Roscoe, Krista Stokes,** and **Mel Watkins**—provide students with a full range of advising services, from evaluating previous college transcripts to formulating academic plans to writing graduate school letters of recommendation. One CGS student recalled, "When I transferred to CGS, I experienced the most welcoming attitude from my advisor, **Jessica Roscoe**, who showed sincere concern in helping me to find the program I wanted to complete."

Another CGS student commented, "I will be forever grateful to **John Oravetz** for his help and guidance as my advisor."

Students are required to see their advisors at least once each term before registering for classes. This provides the advisors with an opportunity to meet with students to discuss their academic progress and review their course selections. Reflecting on her advising appointment, one CGS student said, "My CGS advisor, **Krista Stokes**, happily answered all of my questions and was willing to go above and beyond to make sure that I had the information to succeed."

CGS advisors go well beyond just providing answers to questions about transfer credits, study abroad opportunities, or specific course requirements. Advisors are mentors, confidants, and advocates who empower students to make informed decisions about their academic choices and career plans. One CGS student recalled, "**Tim Carr** was more than my advisor; he became my friend. He never forgot who I was, and he supported me by giving me a listening ear. He would not let me fail!"

During personalized one-on-one appointments, the advising staff discuss goals and aspirations with their advisees and develop individualized academic plans that make sense for each student and that will fit with students' busy work schedules and family commitments. Another CGS student reflected, "Mel Watkins has been very supportive of me. Regardless of whether my issues were personal or school related, he has always been there to help me through them. He believed in me when I didn't believe in myself. How do you ever say thank you to someone like Mel? He is what Pitt is all about!"
